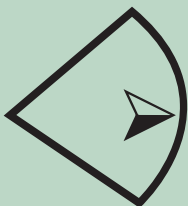
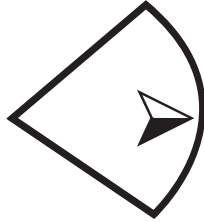

Confused, I looked down at the spot that I had left him. I didn't know whether to be scared or relieved. Since I was a boy, I remember the words of our great teacher Moses about serving the poor. "You shall give to him freely, and your heart shall not be grudging when you give to him, because for this the Lord your God will bless you in all your work and in all that you undertake. a word to hosts/ leaders of the group

Starting this 5-week community group study, you likely have a wide variety of emotions going through your head and your heart right now. introduction

Welcome to *Advancement: Moving in Authority and Confidence*, a 5-session small groups curriculum from Crossline Community Church. Although you can do this curriculum individually, it is best in the context of a small group of people. We pray that this content will bless you and assist you in your process of discipleship.

In *Advancement*, we will have the chance to look closely at Acts chapters 3 and 4 and get a picture of how a community, filled with the Holy Spirit of Jesus, acts. Jesus said in Matthew 16 that He was going to build a church that would prevail against the gates of hell. Never for an instant was He intending to build a church that would walk timidly and fearfully in the world, shrinking back from opposition. He was going to build a church that would be filled with the power of God to forcefully advance against demonic strongholds and the afflictions of a broken world. In this series, we will get the chance to see how believers in Jesus can move confidently, with authority, to claim territory amongst the broken and the lost, against the opposition and within the church.

Some of you are starting this study as a continuation of the other two studies that preceded it. However, if not, that's okay! Each of the studies can, indeed, stand-alone. If you enjoy this study, I will encourage you to go back and do the other two parts that complete this collection. Part 1 is called *Expectation: Living as Children of Promise* and centers around Acts, chapter 1. Part 2 picks up where *Expectation* leaves off in Acts, chapter 2 and is called *Outpouring: Unleashed with Holy Spirit Power*. All of these studies are uniform in format and produced by Crossline Community Church.

session 1

CLAIMING TERRITORY AMONGST THE BROKEN (ACTS 3:1-10)

“What I have, I give you...” These words spoken by the Apostle Peter in Acts 3:6 are far more powerful than many may realize, considering what transpired just a chapter earlier. For it is the Holy Spirit of Jesus whom Peter and John now have. Peter and John had followed Jesus throughout His ministry and saw countless miracles done by Him. Now that authority over brokenness and affliction was theirs through the Holy Spirit. Is our authority in Christ the first thing we think of when we encounter hurting people? Or are we conditioned to think about fixing it with money, programs, or professional help? Though these things aren't wrong and have their place, what would happen if we, in faith, began to give the Holy Spirit the chance to move. Could it be possible that we would see more of the “greater works” that Jesus talked about in John 14:12?

READ

Open your Bible and read the following scriptures aloud as a group, taking a moment between each scripture to make some quick observations.

Acts 3:1-10

John 14:10-14

John 5:2-9

Isaiah 58:6-12

Psalms 140:12

DISCUSS

1. Based on the scriptures you just read, how does God feel about poor, needy, broken, and oppressed people? How should this guide a Christian's behavior?
2. Is it difficult for you to pray for people in need? Why or why not?
3. How do you think Jesus wants His followers to engage with people in need?
4. What promises does the Lord give us regarding our actions toward the poor, needy, broken, and oppressed?
5. Why is having faith so important to the follower of Jesus who is engaging with hurting people?

APPLY

This week, find an opportunity to pray with someone in need—physically, mentally, financially, socially, etc. When you pray, remind yourself of the truth of John 14:10-14 and try and pray more boldly in light of that truth.

session 2

CLAIMING TERRITORY AMONGST THE LOST (ACTS 3:11-4:4)

“No terms except complete and unconditional surrender can be accepted,” were the words spoken by Union Brigadier General and later U.S. President Ulysses S. Grant after his victory over the Confederate armies at Fort Donelson. Grant had positioned a fleet of warships behind Fort Donelson and made a strong advance against his opponent to capture the fort at just the right time. This was the first momentous victory that gave way to a long series of victories by the Union armies and the ultimate defeat of the Confederacy.

Many historic battles were won because of a leader’s ability to act at the right time and place. Similarly, opportunities to proclaim the Gospel come across our path more often than we are aware of in our faith journey. However, walking in the Holy Spirit gives us the ability always to be “battle-ready.” Not only can the Holy Spirit give us eyes to see the opportunities, but also the confidence to not hesitate in our Advancement of the Gospel of Jesus. When the opportunity arises for Peter and John in Acts 3, they saw it, and they act (v. 12). If we want to take territory amongst the lost, we must live “not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil” (Eph. 5:15b-16). With a well-placed, Spirit-guided proclamation of the Gospel, Peter and John see many people come to believe (4:4).

READ

Open your Bible and read the following scriptures aloud as a group, taking a moment between each scripture to make some quick observations.

Acts 3:11-4:4

Rom. 10:11-15

Mark 16:15-16

Ephesians 5:8-16

1 Peter 3:15-18

DISCUSS

1. What created the opportunity for Peter and John to share the Gospel of Jesus in Acts 3?
2. What do you notice about how Peter and John shared the Gospel? How do you see this relating to what Peter states in 1 Pet. 3:15-16?
3. In Acts 3:17, Peter recognizes that the Jewish people and leadership “acted in ignorance” in their condemnation of Jesus. Reflect on Eph. 5:8-16. What is the responsibility of the follower of Jesus, considering those who are acting in ignorance?
4. What keeps us as followers of Jesus from talking about the truth of Jesus with lost people?
5. How does the Holy Spirit help us with this task of claiming territory amongst the lost?

APPLY

This week, find a way to share your testimony with someone that doesn't know Jesus. One way to do this is to share a short video or written post on your social media accounts. For others, it may mean writing out something and posting it on the message board in your office. Even others, it may mean a phone call to an old friend that doesn't know your story. This task will be far more difficult for some of you, but lean into the challenge and leave the results to God. You can do it! 4:10-14 and try and pray more boldly in light of that truth.

session 3

CLAIMING TERRITORY AMONGST THE OPPOSITION (ACTS 4:5-22)

Fear comes from insecurity. When we question our safety—physical, emotional, financial, psychological, or otherwise—we can drift to acting out of fear. We’ve all experienced it. Maybe you froze up when you were on that climbing wall. Perhaps you withheld the whole truth when sharing something with your boss. Perhaps you didn’t stand up for what was right when your friends did something you knew was wrong. In our life as Christians, the more that we know WHO it is that lives within us, the more secure and confident we can be in the world around us.

When Peter and John state in 4:19, “judge for yourselves whether it is right in God’s sight to obey you rather than God,” they were acknowledging the fact that God was a greater and more powerful authority than their opposers. When we, as believers, fear God more than we fear man and behave as such with obedience to God, it frustrates evil men. With confidence in the Holy Spirit, submitted Christians do not capitulate to evil. Jesus tells us not to fear when brought into challenging situations, telling us that the Holy Spirit will intercede on our behalf (Matt. 10:19-20). Paul also reminds us that we are more than conquerors through Christ (Rom. 8:37).

READ

Open your Bibles and read the following scriptures aloud as a group, taking a moment between each scripture to make some quick observations.

DISCUSS

1. Why do you think Peter and John are able to be so bold when challenged by the Jewish leaders here in Acts 4?
2. When considering Peter and John's situation, why couldn't the Jewish leaders stop the message from spreading? What did Peter and John do, and what did God do?
3. In what ways do we, as followers of Jesus, experience opposition in our world today? In what ways are you experiencing opposition personally?
4. How can we grow in our confidence, knowing that God is with us and will assist us in situations where our faith is challenged?
5. What is your biggest takeaway from this session?
6. What can oppose God and win? (This should be an obvious answer, but if you need help, look at Rom. 8:31-37).

REFLECT

Did you have a chance to share your testimony last week? How was that for you? Does anything happen as a result?

APPLY

You can choose to do this as a group or individually. Take some time to think through some of the personal fears or insecurities you have and write them down on paper. Then, take the paper and lay it on the floor or table in front of you and offer your fears/insecurities to the Lord. In the name of Jesus, declare their power over you broken and useless to our enemy, the devil

session 4

CLAIMING TERRITORY WITHIN THE CHURCH (ACTS 4:23-31)

We have an enemy who is terrified of a Spirit-empowered church. From that understanding, we ought not to be surprised that the enemy is seeking to infiltrate and divide churches. He also is seeking to neutralize believers, keeping them from being fully activated in the power and purpose of the Holy Spirit. Therefore, even territories can be claimed within churches, and we must seek to expose and break the enemy's lies. The moment that we read about in Acts 4:23-31 is one of the most exciting moments of the Bible as we observe a community of believers raising their voices, as one, in prayer. In response, the Lord shakes the place they were meeting. Can you imagine being there in that instance? How would that have hit you? It gives a lot of understanding to what happens with the church throughout the rest of the book of Acts.

Believers together, praying with authority and confidence, leave little room for the enemy to infiltrate. "And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock, I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (Matt. 16:18)

DISCUSS

1. What do you notice about how these believers pray in 4:24? What other observations can you make about the way they pray?
2. Paul calls the church the pillar and foundation of the truth in 1 Timothy 3. What do you think that means?
3. How does the devil try and divide churches?
4. Based on what you read, how can we thwart the devil's attempts and remain united and strong?

5. Jesus speaks to seven churches in Revelation Chapters 2-3. The church in Smyrna and the church in Philadelphia, which you read about, are the churches in which Jesus has no criticism. Looking at Acts 4:23-31, what is it about these two churches that make them different? What are some distinctions of a healthy, advancing church?

6. What can oppose God and win? (This should be an obvious answer, but if you need help, look at Rom. 8:31-37).

REFLECT

How was that experience of laying down your fears/insecurities for you last week?

APPLY

This week, send an encouraging text/email/letter to each of the other members of your group. You can do it all at once or send it over several days, but make sure everyone gets one. Encouragement is something we all need and is remarkably important to deepening relationships.

session 5

A COMMUNITY OF CLAIMERS (ACTS 4:32-37)

My best friend growing up was awakened to his love for writing music when he was a teenager. He would spend hours in front of his piano, making all sorts of melodies and sounds. He went to school for Music Composition at a prestigious art college. I remember talking to him on the phone as he, with wild enthusiasm, would tell me about his progression toward becoming a composer. First, it was a 6-piece ensemble, then a 12-piece, then 20, and finally a full 40-piece chamber orchestra! "I can't even begin to tell you how amazing it is to hear my music played by 40 musicians!" Don't you think this is the same heart of our Heavenly Composer?

One believer, empowered with the Holy Spirit and walking with authority and confidence, can do incredible things. A community of people empowered with the Holy Spirit and walking with authority and confidence can shake the world. Is that not what happened here in Acts? Jesus told them back in the beginning of the church, "but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8). As Christians, we are here studying God's word today because the Holy Spirit's work with these men and women in Acts. That same Spirit lives in you and me, and the Kingdom will continue to advance through us when we are united and submitted to His power. So, friend, take up the sword of the Spirit and ADVANCE!

4. What would happen if we lived out Acts 4:32-35 today? Try to get specific.
5. How can your group be a catalyst for this type of community?

ingredients for a great group

Whether you have been a part of a group like this before or not, please take a look at the following guidelines to help your group function to its greatest possible potential.

- **Don't Miss it!** This first tip is a big one! As a community group, commit not to miss a gathering! And be on time! If you are going to miss or be late, make it a commitment to let your host/group know ahead of time! (Not an hour before the group starts!)
- **Assign a timekeeper!** Within the group, someone appreciates organization and timeliness—assign this person to be the timekeeper for group time together. Permit this person to move things along to make sure everything gets done, and the group ends on time.
- **Keep it Confidential!** One of the beautiful things about Community Groups is the deep, meaningful conversation that happens. A definitive rule for your group that everyone ought to agree on is to keep sensitive things that are shared confidential!
- **R-E-S-P-E-C-T!** Your group comprises all sorts of people that come from all kinds of backgrounds—it's one of the great features of your group! As a group, commit to making your group a safe environment with mutual respect. Respect not only your fellow group members and your host but also the property of who's home you are meeting!

- **Have Fun!** Don't forget to have fun! Laugh! Play games! You can even make specific space for that stuff!
- **EAT UP!!** Food always provides a sense of comfort and unity in group settings, so whether it's a full meal, snacks, dessert, or coffee—Eat up!
- **Take Turns!** Many groups find ways for members to take turns on things such as providing food, leading prayer requests, texting reminders, or opening their home for the group. It's always healthy to not have one person in charge of something every time. (You can even assign a group member to coordinate this).
- **Find your groove!** Here is what is essential to know—no community group is the same, and that's okay! As a group, find your groove on how you do things and stick with it.
- **Don't let kids control!** If you are a group with kids, make group time a priority. It's easy to become overwhelmed with kids and their schedules and babysitters, but don't let that control your involvement! As a group, figure out the best scenario for childcare early on so that you can fully participate in the group. (E.g. Individual babysitters, group babysitter(s), putting on a movie in the back room, etc.)

commitment contract

(Some groups may want to consider utilizing this simple commitment contract as a way of keeping each other accountable to healthy group participation.)

- I commit to engaging in conversation.

creating a multiplying group

“Every day, they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.” (Acts 2:46-47)

The traditional and most widely accepted understanding of a small group in western culture is that it is a place for you to find friends from your church that you can grow close to over the course of years as you study the Bible. It is a social gathering with a spiritual emphasis. Then, once you find the right mix of friends, you protect it so that you can have an inner-circle community that you can do life with; we believe this is a central part of small groups. However, this definition is not fully complete and is lacking the missional purpose of a small group. As we see in the passage above, the Lord added daily those who were being saved as a response to the fellowship of believers meeting in their homes and in the temple courts. As a follower of Jesus, isn't that your greatest hope? People being saved? If we collectively share this hope, we must acknowledge that it needs to be a core emphasis of our small group gatherings.

Similarly, small groups of believers must also have the same heart and attitude as Christ, who compassionately saw the crowds of Israel as “sheep without a shepherd” (Matt. 9:36) and who pulled the outcasts and overlooked into community with him. So, whether it's someone lost in sin or an uninvited brother or sister, small groups of God's people must have open doors.

Anything healthy and attractive will grow. If your group is healthy, you should expect it to grow. Our job is not to stifle growth and, with prayerful discernment, seek out the will of God for our group. That said, here are five helpful tips that you can weave into the leadership of your group that will create a culture of multiplication while still maintaining closeness with those in the group.

- **Communicate and Meta-Message the vision:** One of the essential parts of creating a multiplying group is to be clear about the mission and purpose of your group. This means that it would be wise to communicate the vision for your group at the start of each new study and check in with your group members about that vision. You also can meta-message the vision in group discussion throughout each study.
- **Stay Flexible:** Be very careful not to get too rigid in the structure or makeup of your group, which would prohibit newcomers from participating and stunt growth. Instead, be flexible to change things up and be checking in with your group members often.
- **Celebrate newcomers:** If you or one of your group members happens to (after first notifying the group) bring a newcomer, celebrate their participation! Be sure to extend loving hospitality that makes them feel genuinely welcome. Do your very best, as a group, not to come off as cliquey or exclusive.
- **Train up the members of your group:** As a leader, you should always be seeking to train the group members to lead as well. You can do this by asking them to facilitate conversation, lead prayer, set up the meeting schedule, select and lead a study, etc. Then be sure to follow up with them about it. If you are doing everything yourself, you are not creating a multiplying

group.

- Plant seeds of leadership: One of the biggest reasons people do not lead or serve in ways they are capable of is that they are not asked. As you begin to notice certain members of the group evidencing leadership skills and spiritual maturity, it may be time to ask them if they would consider leading a group of their own. That can mean passing the torch of leadership to them OR having them start their own group OR splitting/subgrouping the group (which is growing) and having them lead the other group out of the split.

Having a multiplying group that you truly see people connected and brought to salvation through is wildly rewarding. I fully understand that it may seem to be disruptive to the closeness of your group. Still, counterintuitively, it brings a group much closer as you engage in mission together and see God working through it. Don't feel like you have to start over every time your group grows, but rather just pull people on board for the journey that you are already on and trust the Holy Spirit!
